



We began this work with the understanding that essential repairs for those in need can revitalize communities, and rebuild lives.

As we reach the end of 2023, we reflect with pride on the impact we have had on the homeowners we serve, our broader understanding of community, and the impact of each person involved in ensuring more Minnesotans remain safely in their homes.

Minnesota real estate costs continue to rise. Coupled with wage disparities, homeownership challenges, and older housing stock, families who do succeed in acquiring a home often face critical and urgent repairs much earlier, all while having limited resources. We are committed to changing that.

In 2023, we served a record number of neighbors in need. On average, we directly assisted six Minnesotans a week through our programs, and nearly doubled our services in Southwestern Minnesota.

Our efforts are made possible thanks to the ongoing support from a diverse coalition of community members. We are thankful for our continued partnership with the Occupational Therapy program at St. Catherine's University, the Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center, and the generous contributions from contractors, local laborers, and in-kind donations of supplies.

The impact of our work goes beyond the families directly benefiting from these repairs. It provides their loved ones with peace of mind, knowing their family is safe at home. Moreover, it ensures that when individuals decide to move, those homes remain affordable for future generations or can be passed down. This contributes to the stabilization of communities, shielding them from gentrification and potential displacement.

We are grateful to everyone who supported our work in 2023. This year of meaningful repairs in the communities we call home is shared with each of you. As we look to the future, we continue to strategically expand into areas of need, deepen our connections with communities across Minnesota, and support those most in need with repairs and modifications to their homes.




Repair Homes

Homeowner Projects Completed



This year, with the support of volunteers, local contractors, and in-kind support from businesses in our community, we supported 328 unique addresses with home repairs, accessibility, and aging in place modifications. These repairs affect 634 Minnesotans in over 60 cities and a dozen counties.


We directly supported four community centers this year serving over 1000 people, including over 900 children and over 60 older adults.

This year, 217 incredible volunteers poured more than 4,500 hours into supporting our mission, demonstrating the extraordinary impact of community spirit and selflessness. They rolled up their sleeves during county rebuilding days, offered their skills with administrative tasks, and so much more. Each hour given reflects their unwavering commitment and passion for making a difference and has real monetary value! Collectively, volunteers donated \$170,475.45 in value. This year, we continued our relationship with VUYO Community Partners to champion equitable economic opportunities for the diverse youth in the Twin Cities. Their commitment to launching our Workforce Development Program has been essential in uniting educators and community leaders, ensuring that our Summit effectively meets the needs of underserved youth aspiring to careers in the construction trades. The Workforce Development Summit is planned to launch in spring of 2025.

Non-Profit Support



Through the National Neighborhood Promise Grants from Republic Services, we had the opportunity to support the Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center by providing new flooring, painting hallways, and enhancing outdoor spaces. This investment ensures that the Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center can effectively meet the needs of Native women, including offering transitional housing and emergency shelter. in addition, this support enabled several projects within the surrounding neighborhood, expanding our impact into underserved commmunities.

Rebuilding Together proudly works from the margins by prioritizing service to those communities who have historically been impacted by systemic barriers to homeownership, the disruption of generational wealth, and who are most at risk of housing instability.

AREA MEDIAN INCOME

The vast majority of our homeowners are at or below 50% of the area median income (AMI). For a family of four in the Twin Cities, this means a household income of less than \$62,100 per year. Most of them are at or below 30% AMI, meaning a household of four would be earning less than \$37,250 per year.



The current housing landscape in Minnesota presents significant challenges, as owning a home has become increasingly expensive, particularly when considering that many homes are considerably older and may require critical repairs that can quickly lead to financial strain. With a large portion of older adults choosing to age in place, the need for accessible housing becomes even more pressing, especially given that less than 4% of homes nationwide meet accessibility standards. Disparities in housing based on race and gender persist, exacerbated by the recent rise in interest rates, which have erased many of the gains made during the pandemic. At Rebuilding Together Minnesota, we are committed to addressing these issues by providing essential repairs for low-income homeowners, enabling them to maintain their homes and avoid displacement. Our work not only helps families stay housed but also supports wealth-building through property inheritance, closing ownership gaps, building community, and ultimately fostering a more equitable and stable community.






